Psalm 121

Dear Friends and Members of St. George's,

Psalm 121 is a psalm for travellers. The people of Israel sang it on their way to the temple in Jerusalem where they met and celebrated the Passover Feast and other festivals. For many people it was a long and exhausting journey.

I lift up my eyes to the hills— from where will my help come?

The people of Israel had to go up to Jerusalem. When they reached Jericho, a city closer to Jerusalem there was still 17 km to go and the road goes upward over 1000 meters until you finally reach Jerusalem. We know from Jesus' parable about the good Samaritan that it was a difficult and dangerous way to Jerusalem. In Jesus' time everyone knew that.

There were thieves who had no pity and took from travellers whatever they could get. It was good when people went together, they felt safer in the community.


It was a great feeling of security to sing together. Psalm 121 was one of the special psalms and songs that the people always used when they went on a journey.

Certainly, Jesus sang with all of them along the way, when he was 12 years old and went to the Passover feast for the first time.

In the psalm it is said 6 times that God protects us.

The word "keep" in the Psalm means "protect" or "taking care". God was with them. when the sun was hot in the desert and when the moon was out in the night, when they all slept outside. People had to cope with nature day and night. Sometimes people can't sleep well when the moon is very bright in





Psalm 121 is a psalm for travellers at all times. It is essential to include God in our journey and ask for his protection. He knows our ways before we know them.

He is always with us and we can turn to him in every situation. This gives us confidence and helps us feel secure even in places, where we were never before.

Everywhere we can find people who believe in the same God.

They may sing or recite our Psalm in a different language but is the same psalm about God's protection. Together we can worship God, sing along with their hymns, even in a different language, pray and celebrate. It is great to visit other churches, learn from one another and make new connections. Maybe we will bring new ideas home to our church or we may feel connected through parts of the service that we have in common.

God is with us wherever we are. He protects us and guides us to find community. In the same way it is very special to have guests in our church and welcome them with love. In this way they may feel like a part of our community as long as they are here.

Psalm 121 is also a song during the journey of our lives. It tells us over and over again that we are protected and never alone.

The difficult way is not only the way to Jerusalem. It could also be the way into a surgery, to someone with whom we have difficulties or into a new direction that is completely unknown to us. We all know difficult and uncertain ways in many different areas.

It gives us confidence, that God is close to us and we are never alone.

The last sentence of our Psalm word says:

The LORD will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore.

It means that we will stay in God's hands forever, on our journey through our lives but also when he calls us home, into his eternal kingdom.

Let us join in the song and thank God for his protection and everything that he provides for us.

2. Word from the Church Council President

Dear members and friends of St. George's:



As we approach Thanksgiving, we have many reasons to feel blessed. As you are aware, our finances are an ongoing concern and I am pleased to announce that we received a generous donation from an anonymous donor for which we are extremely grateful. It gives us breathing space for the short term, as we continue to seek long term financial stability. I also feel very blessed to witness the energy and commitment of our members and Council, who are continually striving to make St. George's a wonderful place to worship and to secure our future.

By the time you receive this newsletter, the fall season at St. George's will be in full swing. We will have celebrated the Golden Confirmation and other confirmation anniversaries, at which 27 confirmands are expected. It is great to re-connect and get in contact after a long time. We will be looking forward to celebrating German and Canadian Thanksgiving on October 1 and October 8 respectively (please remember to bring contributions for our food drive!) As I mentioned in the last newsletter, my daughter Kathryn will be getting married at St. George's on October 7, and on October 29 we are looking forward to welcoming back Martin Neuland who will play during the service as well as perform a concert afterwards. Martin is the son of Jutta Neuland, the entire family were former members of our congregation and he was the former head of music at Central Tech, Toronto. The first time he came we didn't quite know what to expect and all of us were blown away by the performance. We are also planning a special event following a mid-November service (date to be advised), when our Church Council member Jacqueline Myers, who is a Personal Trainer, will give a us a 30-minute presentation on Fall Prevention. She will provide advice on how to prevent falls before they happen with tips on creating a safe environment in our home and simple exercises to help with balance and strength.

Your Council is also continuing to work on improving our property. Not only is it important to have a nice place of worship for our members, but it will also be more attractive to future renters. Next on the agenda is removing the graffiti. Now that the roof is fixed, we will repair water damage caused by leaks, and repair and repaint affected areas in the sanctuary and Katharina's office. We anticipate work will commence in October.

This summer, your Council also spent time discussing the future of the Church. The focus of our discussions was how to better serve our members, how to grow our community and how to improve our finances. Some highlights of our discussion were as follows:

- Our church community is much larger than the number of people who attend our Sunday services. We estimate that our community is bigger than the 170 members on our congregation list. We have many friends of the congregation, for instance more than 100 on our "newsletter friends" list; other people attend our Swabien Club services or services outside the church in nature, homes and Senior's homes.
- To better understand our member's needs, and what we can do to attract new members, we will be interviewing our community to find out what they need personally from St. George's and what they think St. George should do to be sustainable in the longer term. We have identified some target demographic groups in our congregation, which we would like to interview e.g. this year's confirmation class students and their parents, select regular attendees, those who can no longer attend our services etc.

If you would like to have a discussion with us on this important issue to make your views known, please contact Katharina or myself.

- To attract new members, we need to improve our social media profile. We will increase the number of posts on Instagram one announcing our upcoming service (Fridays), an inspirational message on Tuesdays, and possibly a third message during the week. Right now, we are focusing on Instagram which tends to attract a younger demographic but will improve our Facebook presence and start sending more frequent email updates in due course. What you can do to help us is to start "following" us and encourage your family and friends to "follow" us as well.
- We have also placed a "Space for rent sign" outside the building which is attracting attention and will redesign our website so that information about rentals is more prominent.

If there is anything you would like to discuss with your Council -- Katharina Moeller, Erna Brusch, Lisa Hoberg, Jacqueline Myers, Andrea Read, Karin Schemeit, Angela SenGupta, Karen Spolsky, or myself, please feel free to reach out – we are all ears. Also, if you would like to help us in any way e.g., kitchen, redecorating, garden, being involved in a service or support the church through a donation, please let us know.

In closing, we look forward to seeing you over the coming months and wish God's blessings to all!

Things to think about:



Consider leaving some part of your estate to organizations that are dear to you. This can be either in the form of a certain sum or certain percentage. Even a small amount can make a big difference. The church is one such possibility! If you appreciate the role that the church has played in your life than this is a good option for you.

The most important thing is that it is **your** will. And that it is clear and up to date as to what your wishes are. If you need help, please reach out to Pastor Katharina or myself. We can help connect you with a lawyer who is able to ask you the right questions to help you decide what is best.




